Showbiz Club Performances

Monday 30th November, 2020

ITEM 1. Sylvester Kroyherr

Wandering minstrel Sylvester (guitar, vocals) got our night off to a wonderful start.

- ♪ Sylvester started with the popular Rogers and Hart tune, **Blue Moon.** Written in 1934, early versions had quite different lyrics to the ones we know today. Then, in hopes of a more commercial version, the publishing company asked for more romantic lyrics and a "punchier" title, thus the version that we know today was born.
- ☐ The second number was Jambalaya (also known as On the Bayou) which was written by country music great, Hank Williams. Released in July 1952, it reached number one on the U.S. country charts for fourteen nonconsecutive weeks.





ITEM 2. John Fordham & Friends

Drummer John Fordham gathered a great selection of friends for the second act; Kim Harris on piano, Doug Kuhn on bass and Roger Taylor on sax.

- J They began with I'll Remember April written by Jean DePaul, Pat Johnson and Don Raye in 1942. This tune first appeared in a rather unlikely performance. Dick Foran introduced the song in the 1942 Abbott and Costello comedy Ride 'Em Cowboy.
- Cole Porter's classic **Night and Day** followed shortly thereafter. Teamed with Claire Luce, Fred Astaire introduced it in the Broadway musical, Gay Divorce. Later this would be adapted for film, but with a slight change to the title. The change was requested

by the Hays Office which insisted that divorce could not be gay but a *divorcee* might well be.

ITEM 3. Anita Harris and Friends

This group comprised Anita Harris (vocals), Kim Harris (piano), Doug Kuhn (bass) and Alan Richards (drums).

- ↑ They opened with **Serenade in Blue**, first introduced in the 1942 film, Orchestra Wives. It was written by Harry Warren with lyrics by Mack Gordon and was recorded by Glenn Miller and His Orchestra, sung by Lynn Bari in the film but dubbed by Pat Friday.
- ☐ The second number was **This**Masquerade, a song written by American singer and musician Leon Russell. It was originally recorded in 1972 by Russell for his album Carney and as a B-side for the album's hit single "Tight Rope".





ITEM 4. Roger Clark Quartet

The quartet featured Roger on sax, John Curtis on piano, Doug Kuhn on bass and Larry Kean on drums. (Joined by a guest for the second number.)

♪ The gorgeous We'll Be Together Again was their opener. Composed by Carl T. Fischer, with lyrics by Frankie Laine, the Pied Pipers were the first to release the song.
Jane Little (vocals) then joined the group for a swinging version of East of the Sun. First recorded by Hal Kemp in 1934, it was written by Brooks Bowman for the Princeton Triangle Club's production of Stags at Bay in 1934.

ITEM 5. Rachel Camerino and her Gentlemen of Jazz

Vocalist Rachel was joined by the following gentlemen: John Curtis (piano), Doug Kuhn (bass), John Calamatta (sax) and Allan Smith (drums).

- It was a gentle start with George and Ira Gershwin's Embraceable You. Ginger Rogers and Allen Kearns introduced an Alvin Theatre audience to Embraceable You during the first performance of Girl Crazy, but it was Bobby Hackett's 1939 big band recording that made musicians aware of the virtues of this tune.
- Rachel then headed off down Route 66.
 Composed in 1946 by Bobby Troup, it's been recorded by many over the years including a very popular version by Nat King Cole.





ITEM 6. Café Rio

Leader John Calamatta (sax) gathered Graeme Davies (piano), Doug Foley (bass) and Larry Kean (drums) on stage.

↑ They opened with the Duke Ellington, Billy Strayhorn number, Satin Doll. Originally a modest, instrumental hit, Johnny Mercer wrote the lyrics five years after the music and it went on to be recorded in those early years by Peggy Lee and Ella Fitzgerald to great acclaim.

Cole Porter's, You'd Be So Nice to Come Home To was the group's second tune. It originally featured in the 1943 film Something to Shout About, where it was introduced by Janet Blair and Don Ameche. The song was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Original Song in 1943 but lost to You'll Never Know.

ITEM 7. The Two Js

The two Js (Judee Horin on piano and vocals) and Janet Arndt on vocals) were joined by a D and a P – Doug Foley on bass and Paul Phillips on drums.

- ♪ The Buddy Holly hit Raining in My Heart was this group's first number. It was recorded by Buddy in 1958 with orchestral backing by Dick Jacobs. The music and lyrics are written by the songwriting team of Felice Bryant and Boudleaux Bryant.
- ☐ They followed this with **Singing the Blues**, made popular by Guy Mitchel in 1956. The song was written by Melvin Endsley, published in 1956 and spent ten weeks at number #1 on the U.S. charts.

ITEM 8. Anne Hayres & John Curtis

Anne (vocals) and John (piano) were joined by Doug Kuhn (bass) and Paul Phillips (drums).

↑ They started with classic bossa nova The Shadow of Your Smile. Also known as "Love Theme from The Sandpiper", the music was written by Johnny Mandel with lyrics written by Paul Francis Webster. The song was introduced in the 1965 film The Sandpiper.

↑ The second tune was the Jimmy Van Heusen / Johnny Burke number Here's That Rainy Day. It was originally introduced by Dolores Gray in the Broadway musical Carnival in Flanders in 1953.

ITEM 9. Vincent O'Connor

Vincent sang, accompanied by Judee Horin on piano.

- ☐ This was followed by **Torna a Surriento** (Return to Sorrento), a Neapolitan song composed in 1894 by Italian musician Ernesto De Curtis to words by his brother, the poet and painter Giambattista De Curtis. The song was copyrighted officially in 1905.





ITEM 10. Trio Threeo

This long-running group comprised John Curtis on piano, Doug Kuhn on bass and Paul Phillips on drums.

- J They started with the Saga of Harrison Crabfeathers, which was written by Steve Kuhn and was first recorded and released by Monica Zetterlund in 1972.
- ☐ The second of their pair was Thelonious Monk's Rhythm-A-Ning, which was first recorded on May 15, 1957, for the album Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers with Thelonious Monk.

ITEM 11. Annie and Johnny

The Annie and Johnny in question were vocalist Annie Smith and pianist John Curtis. They were joined by Doug Kuhn on bass and Allan Smith on drums.

- ♪ Annie's first offering was a parody of the old vaudeville tune by Gerald Marks and Seymour Simons, **All of Me**, inspired by much recent medical fun. "Why not replace all of me!"
- Next, Annie put her personal spin on the Bee Gee's hit tune, Lonely Days. In this case, Covid was front of mind as she sang, "Lonely days and lonely nights... when are we gonna get a vaccine". When indeed?



ITEM 12. Rae and Grae.

Rae and Grae included Ray Quon on piano, Graeme Davies on vocals and sax, Doug Foley on bass and Larry Kean on drums.

- ♪ Their first tune was the 1945 song, **Autumn** Leaves. This well-known standard was composed by Joseph Kosma with original lyrics by Jacques Prévert in French, and later by Johnny Mercer in English.
- ☐ They closed the night with the 1929 number, Ain't Misbehaving, sung by Ray. Fats Waller and Harry Brooks wrote this classic, which was introduced at Connie's Inn in Harlem during the opening of the all-black musical revue, Hot Chocolates. The show proved such a success that it moved onto Broadway, and ran for 219 performances. In all, there were also half a dozen hit recordings in 1929.
